RPCV OBITUARY: CHARLENE HOLZWARTH (1927-2007)

Charlene Holzwarth hosted all of CRPCA's potlucks in her Grant Park home for over five years in the late 1990s and early part of this decade.

As a founding member of the Leach Botanical Garden, and 44-year member of the Native Plant Society of Oregon, Charlene Holzwarth knew a thing or two about the seasons of life. Charlene peacefully passed away on Sunday, March 4, 2007. Because of her tireless volunteer efforts, life continues to grow in the garden.

Born in Beattie, Kan., on April 17, 1927, Charlene Marie McMahon was Martin and Maida's second to youngest of five children: Audrey, Virginia, Martin, her twin, Shirley, and younger brother, Ronald Lee "Mickey," her only surviving sibling.

After graduating from Kansas State University, Charlene headed west to Oregon. She was known for having an adventurous nature, and was well liked during her employment as a caseworker for Marion County's Welfare Department. A Salem co-worker and her husband arranged for Charlene to meet Milbert "Slim" Holzwarth, a World War II vet working for the U.S. Forest Service in Hebo. Between Salem, Portland and the Coast the two fell in love and were married in 1951. Together they raised three children, Patrick, Heather and Benton, and experienced more of Oregon together by living in John Day and Eugene before finally settling back in Portland.

Charlene continued her education at Portland State University, where she received her teaching certificate, and went on to enjoy a 34-year career teaching in Portland elementary schools. She remained a teacher late into life and far after retirement, always embracing opportunities that allowed her to learn and share.

Charlene was active in the Grant Park Neighborhood Association, Geological Society of the Oregon Country, PTA and youth organizations, especially 4-H. The Holzwarth's combined love



of the outdoors and Charlene's natural ability to nurture and teach provided a healthy foundation for her family.

The Holzwarths traveled the United States until Milbert's death in 1982. Knowing the best way to help oneself is to help others, Charlene once again gave in to adventure and nurture, and in 1984 joined the Peace Corps. She served her two-year volunteer mission in Sierra Leone, Africa, teaching the Queen's English and demonstrating teaching techniques to village elementary school teachers. She oversaw projects to repair four remote schools, and traveled out the a motor-

After the Corps, continued travel independent seeing all Scandinavia, Ireland, Madagascar, Australia, Zealand, and

her back to what she considered one of the most beautiful places on Earth, Oregon, and Portland was always considered her base of operations.

Because of her involvement in the Native Plant Society of Oregon, Charlene became active in helping the City of Portland Parks acquire its legacy: the John and Lilla Leach estate to the southeast of Portland. (Lilla Leach was a pioneering Oregon botanist responsible for the discovery of several species within the state.) Charlene was instrumental in mending the broken down garden and bringing the house to an acceptable standard for public use and continued to tend it throughout her life. In 1995, she gave tribute to the original property owners by co-authoring a book on the Leach's, "The Botanist and Her Muleskinner." Today, the Leach Botanical Garden stands tall as a monument to Oregon's native plants. In 2003, Charlene Holzwarth was recognized as a fellow of the NPSO for her own contributions to Oregon's botanical knowledge.

As an explorer and teacher, Charlene freely shared her knowledge and love for very little in return. As a volunteer, she found time to further her every cause. Charlene asked that if you mark her life with a remembrance, it should be to your cherished cause.

She is survived by her brother, Mickey; three children and their spouses, Pat of Portland, Heather and Steve Stanhope of Summerville, and Benton and Cary of Tigard; three grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; and numerous nephews and nieces.

Blossoms fade and drop, only to return to lush life when the ground has been worked with effort and affection. Death is simply one phase of life in a healthy garden. Charlene Holzwarth knew this about life and will be missed.

Diamond Lake is located 80 miles east of Roseburg on Highway 138, turn right onto Road 4795 (Diamond Lake Loop) at the north entrance to Diamond Lake Recreation Area. Proceed 3.2 miles and turn right at the South Shore. Go 0.5 miles to the campground entrance on the left. Broken Arrow may also be accessed via Highway 230 from Medford, or Highway 97 from Klamath Falls and Bend.
