FREE STUFF IN SEPTEMBER

Whether you're new to town or not, the local economy isn't so hot. Here are some FREE things going on in September.

Every night in September: [Return of the Vaux's Swifts](#) (tens of thousands of small birds) to their roost in the Chapman School chimney. This is one of the most incredible natural phenomena you can witness in a North American city, and it's developed a cool cultural vibe as well. Hundreds to thousands gather nightly throughout September at NW 27th and Pettygrove. Pettygrove is a dead-end street, so your best bet is to park several blocks away. Bring a chair or blanket, set up your picnic by 7pm, then take in the atmosphere as you watch for the swirls to begin.

Friday, Sept 25: Free evening at the [Portland Art Museum](#). PAM now offers free entry (5-8 pm) on the fourth Friday of every month. Expect a crowd.

Saturday, Sept 26: [National Museum Day](#). Eight participating museums are within an hour's drive of Portland. For each museum, you must print a coupon from the Museum Day website to gain free entrance for you and a guest. If you show up without it, you'll have to pay regular entrance fees. This is what keeps the event not too frenetic. This event is nationwide, so do tell your family and friends in other states.

Friday night Sept 18 thru Sunday noon Sept 20, Lockaby Campground, Mt Hood National Forest. From Estacada, go about 15 miles east on OR 224. Lockaby is on the left side of the road as you are driving to Indian Henry. After leaving Estacada on Hwy 224, you'd reach Lockaby before you'd reach Indian Henry. There is no cell phone service at Lockaby.

Description: 900-foot elevation. 30 campsites on the wild and scenic Clackamas River. From just below Indian Henry campground to the North Fork Reservoir, the river contains 12.5 miles of Class III-IV whitewater. The Annual CRPCA Planning Meeting takes place Sunday afternoon at 3 pm so we'll all be packing up and leaving Lockaby around noon or before on Sunday. NEW PC DIRECTOR [VIDEO](#) GREETINGS

This morning I was sworn in as the 18th Director of the Peace Corps. While preparing for this day, I decided that the first thing I wanted to do was to take a moment to introduce myself to the Peace Corps community and thank you for everything you have done and continue to do.

As a Returned Peace Corps Volunteer, this is quite an emotional moment. When I was in that small town in the Dominican Republic, I was consumed by the same daily thoughts: How was I going to master another language? What did it mean to be a 20 year old, training rural school teachers, many twice my age? How would I make a life in a community so far from my home? In 1967, I couldn't have imagined all of the people who had worked so tirelessly to allow a Volunteer like me to help in this small community – a community that most staff would never get the chance to see or experience.

Today, the rolls are slightly reversed. I have spent most of my career working in developing countries – but now I will have the extraordinary opportunity to work with the staff in the U.S. and abroad to ensure that the next generation of Volunteers will have the same quality experience that I had in the Peace Corps. Everybody's service is unique, but I know that no matter where or when someone served – being a Peace Corps Volunteer is a life changing experience. We all tried to make a difference every day. We accomplished a lot with very little. And most importantly, we had the opportunity to recognize what we can achieve when given the tools to succeed. As President Kennedy envisioned, we learned to understand, respect and admire our host communities and countries.

This is my first day at Peace Corps headquarters since my nomination in early July. I am truly excited and honored to be here. In these first few weeks, I will be spending time getting to know many of you, listening to your ideas, and getting reacquainted with this agency that has meant so much to all of us. We'll immediately move forward addressing the challenges -- both old and new – the agency faces.

At this historic moment, America is now led by a President committed to renewing the call to service and the Peace Corps is on the cusp of our 50th anniversary -- I believe there could be no better time for us to work together to capture the imagination of those Americans interested in serving. I can't do this alone. I look forward to working with you to maintain the high standard that has been set by all of those who have come before us. Together, in the 21st century we will build on this legacy and grow a stronger Peace Corps that continues to champion world peace and friendship.

HOST DINNER FOR INT'L VISITORS

In September and October the World Affairs Council of Oregon will have 62 international visitors from 37 countries eager to have dinner with community members while in Portland. We are excited to open up the opportunity to host professionals from around the world to you, fellow internationalists.

For 59 years, the Council's International Visitor Program has brought foreign leaders and specialists to the United States for firsthand exposure to their professional counterparts and U.S. society. The emphasis of the program is to increase mutual understanding through communication at the personal and professional levels. It is described by U.S. Ambassadors as one of the most effective foreign policy tools of American diplomacy.

It is these home hospitality dinners that often make the biggest impact on the international visitors as they allow for one-on-one conversations and a deeper appreciation for the commonalities of life. These visits can lead to long-term friendships.

During September and October you may like to consider adding an element of the fall season' to the dinner hosting experience: you can check in with staff ahead of time to see if there is time to take them to Sauvie Island before heading home for dinner, or on a drive to look at fall leaves.
